Special Zoom presentation OASIS—a model for Aging in Place

We invite you to join us on January 12th, for a Zoom presentation on another example of initiative, creativity and resourcefulness, perhaps on a smaller scale, but also important in helping individuals overcome barriers and establish healing connections within their communities. The Oasis project started in Kingston, Ontario, with the simple observation that a large number of seniors in a highrise apartment building were on waiting lists for Long Term Care. When they were asked what they needed while they were waiting, a number of common themes emerged. For many, their greatest concern was their sense of isolation.

Oasis is an older adult-driven model of aging in place, located in naturally occurring retirement communities (NORCs). Oasis was founded to serve older adults, who, with some support, are able to live independently. (cont'd)

OASIS (cont'd)

The programs and activities offered within an Oasis community are based on the needs and wishes of its members and typically include congregate dining and social activities to address isolation, improve diet and nutrition, offer opportunities to engage in physical exercise and contribute to a sense of purpose. Through collaboration with public sector, not-for-profit, and private sector organizations, Oasis provides a supportive living program for older adults that builds community among members. Oasis seeks to enable seniors to remain at home and age with dignity.

The Oasis communities in Ontario have been established in private sector apartment buildings, but the concept seems easily adaptable to other types of 'NORCs' like the many strata complexes with senior populations in White Rock and other suburban areas in the BC Lower Mainland. Look around you. If you see that you and/or your neighbours may benefit from a bit more 'community', consider taking in the Zoom call on January 12th. Leading the presentation will be Dr. Vincent DePaul an Assistant Professor in the School of Rehabilitation Therapy at Queen's University, who co-leads the expansion and evaluation of Oasis at its Kingston/Quinte sites.
