COSCO's 2025 Conference - 75th Anniversary

The Council of Senior Citizens' Organizations of BC celebrated 75 years of advocacy at their conference October 3—5, 2025. The two-day event included keynote speakers and panels on themes such as

- "Ageism and Human Rights" (featuring Margaret Gillis, the founding president of the International Longevity Centre Canada) and a proponent of the Age-friendly Community program in Canada
- "Understanding Inequality for Seniors in BC" (featuring Dan Levitt, BC Seniors Advocate)
- "Health Care for Older Adults" (featuring Kasari Govender, BC Independent Human Rights Commissioner).

Susie Chant, Parliamentary Secretary for Seniors and Long-Term Care in the BC government spoke to the conference in person, and Stephanie McLean, Parliamentary Secretary for Seniors in the federal government, sent greetings by video link.

Delegates learned of the significant progress that has been made towards the adoption of a United Nations Convention on the Rights of Older Persons. They heard experts and advocates on a wide range of issues—to name just a few: the importance of seniors centres in maintaining community connection, the essential work of family advocates in Long Term Care councils, the urgent need for significant investment in home care services to flatten demand on Long Term care, and the transportation challenges that are particularly acute for persons determined to 'age in place' in rural areas.

Delegates also had time for lighter moments. The program for the Gala Dinner on Saturday included special entertainer comedian Charlie Demers and a video celebrating COSCO's achievements over 75 years.

Branch Treasurer, Kamlesh Kumar and husband Rishi attended the conference in-person, lan Spence monitored the plenary sessions on-line. Kamlesh reports that she is now much more aware of ageism in her day-to-day life. Maybe that's a good thing?

The conference was a great success, an impressive achievement, and reaffirmed COSCO's role as the leading voice for seniors in British Columbia.

Advocates at work!

Branch volunteers continue to reach out to Members of Parliament as new and returning MPs settle in to their roles and as the (relatively) new government prepares to slice the fiscal pie to serve myriad competing priorities.


In these visits, we focus on making the case that **defined benefit pensions** are the best way to ensure Canadians have the benefit of income security in retirement and can contribute to the economy and social life of their communities. We also press for enactment of a **Safe Long Term Care Act** and for federal-provincial collaboration on enforceable standards for long-term care, as well as for more support for unpaid caregivers by—as a minimum—making the **Canada Caregivers Tax Credit** refundable (and therefore accessible to low income households).

Branch volunteers Kamlesh Kumar, Pat Yendrys, Robert MacDonald and Ian Spence met with South Surrey-White Rock MP **Ernie Klassen** on Monday, September 29th, and branch volunteers Steve Sawchuk, Judy McLellan, Leslie Gaudette and Ian Spence met with Cloverdale-Langley City MP **Tamara Jansen** on October 17th. The meetings went well and both MPs were generous with their time, each giving our delegations over an hour to touch on a range of issues. We look forward to hearing back from them on their discussions with caucus colleagues on progress toward a Safe Long Term Care Act.

This event, featuring guest speaker, Heather Martin, on "How to determine when it's time for care", drew a record crowd.

Coles Notes: if you are concerned about someone's ability to live independently, get a doctor's referral to one of Fraser Health's Specialized Seniors Clinics (Langley Memorial, Peace Arch, and the Jimmy Pattison Outpatient Centre). These clinics can offer a

comprehensive assessment and offer some assistance, but be aware, "the Specialized Seniors Clinic does not replace your family doctor or nurse practitioner and usually does not manage long-term follow-up." Better At Home services may be available through community agencies, but there are limitations, charges for some services, and waiting lists. Private home care service providers can fill the gaps but there are costs and often a 3-hour minimum (e.g. 3 x \$42.00), but some providers will offer to co-ordinate so that two or three clients living in the same building or in close proximity, can share and split caregiving costs.

You may recall that your branch hosted a Town Hall a couple of years ago with the title 'Aging in Place Requires a Plan.' We continue to harp on this theme and to nag politicians to invest more in home care services. Thanks to Judy and Sharon for organizing an engaging and informative event!
